March Programs . . .

Day Chapter—

For our program we will show some stunning 19th century red and green quilts, a preview of quilts from a new book by Terry Thompson and Nancy Hornback which will be published this spring and a small slide show.

Terry Thompson and Nancy Hornback first met in 1986 in New York City during the Great American Quilt Festival. Sitting next to each other in the lobby of the Roosevelt Hotel, Nancy introduced herself and they began talking about the Kansas Quilt Project. Through documenting quilts during 1986 and 1987, they became friends. Both were so captivated by the red and green appliqué quilts they were seeing at discovery days, they vowed they would someday work together on a red and green appliqué venture.

In 1992, Nancy wrote a catalog and created an exhibit of red and green appliqué quilts at the Wichita-Sedgwick County Historical Museum as a thesis project for a master's degree. Terry took the path of designing patterns, teaching and lecturing about the history of 19th century appliqué. Now they have decided it is time to act on their 20 year desire to share their enthusiasm for these beautiful quilts.

If you have a red and green quilt, please bring it for show and tell.

Boone County Historical Society Exhibit

DON'T FORGET about our exhibit at the Boone County Historical Society coming up in May. We are interested in Boone County quilts, Missouri quilts, and/or family quilts. If you own a quilt that you would like to share and want to have considered for the exhibition please send or give Bettina Havig a photo or slide, print or electronically, plus any information known about the quilt. In particular, we need the maker, date or approximate date (as you know it), where it was made, and pattern or family name for the quilt pattern. More information may be needed when the selections are made around May 1. Approximately 30-35 quilts will be needed for the exhibit. You must be willing to lend the quilt for the duration of the exhibit. The museum staff will install the exhibit May 12-14 and strike the exhibit at the end of June. You will be asked to sign a loan agreement.

BTQG—More History

In 1994, ASN Publishing produced the book Quilts From the Booneslick Trail Quilter's Guild. The book included quilts resulting from the friendship block activity. This was the first book in what was intended to be an ASN series focusing on guilds' activities or special interests. The BTQG continued to receive royalties from the book until the copyright reverted to the guild in 2007. The proud owners of the quilts in the book are: Shirley Troth, Kathy England, Jane Kessler, Janice Gaston, Sandy Womack, Alice Hinson, Fern Turner, and Erna Lee Dunkerley. Most of those owners are still members.

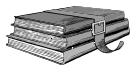
Marketplace Tote Bag Work Day

TIPS, TOOLS & TRICKS

My tool for this month is the Side Winder, the portable bobbin winder. This is a free-standing machine, compact in size, which runs on a power cord or two AA batteries. It is really simple to operate. If your bobbin winder goes out on your sewing machine as did mine, you can use this in its place. This item is made by Wrights. It sure saved me a lot of unnecessary stress.

Also, if you run out of bobbins when quilting or sewing, having a Side Winder keeps you from having to unthread your machine and wind the bobbin and then re-thread the machine. Saves time.

There is only one bobbin that does not work on the this winder and that is the bobbin for the Viking machine. Sorry for those who have Vikings since they will not be able to use this winder.

Several places that I checked on the internet were sold out and on back order. Fortunately two places in Columbia, Satin Stitches and JoAnn's, have them in stock.

Another Tip: If you have old quilts that have age spots and yellow discolorations on them, try using 1 gallon of water and 1 qt. buttermilk with 1 Tbsp. lemon juice. Soak the quilt in this mixture and hand wash with mild soap for reconditioned bright quilt. This mixture is safe and will cause no danger or damage to the quilt.

I made a trip to Appletree Quilting where I bought some Steam-A-Seam Double Stick Fusible Web.

Now I love the fusible method and my fish get to keep their twirly tails and fancy fins. I can't wait to fuse an octopus, snowflakes, spider webs, blades of grass, ants, whatever!

Sharon Lawler – February Day Guild Friendship Block Winner

Sharon was the winner of the Starlight Friendship Block in October 2007 so she plans to continue with the same block so she can make a larger quilt. Sharon chose "Hidden Treasure" and says while she was working with the blocks she received from the evening guild, she really enjoyed seeing the names of her guild friends in the seam allowances of the blocks.

A little more about Sharon: She began teaching home economics and child development and then served as school counselor in 5 districts before coming to Columbia Public School System. She feels like her career has come full circle, since she is back with sewing (her quilting) and young children (screening and testing 3 and 4 year olds). Her husband Larry is an architectural associate in campus facilities at MU. They live south of Hallsville and are parents seven cats.

Sharon recently purchased a long arm quilting system from APQS. She says she has a good role model in her mother who has machine quilted since 1970 and recently completed number 14,000. Her mother's clients include people from every state and several countries.

True Story*

Three weeks before their April 2007 quilt show, the Amador Valley Quilters of Pleasanton, California were sued for the "unauthorized" use of a design by a national designer/quilter.

The guild members thought they had asked for and received permission to use a design by this quilter in a quilt which contained 20 or 30 blocks from other quilters. Though raffle tickets were already sold, the quilt was basically confiscated and could not be used or displayed in any way. So, a new raffle quilt was created by Linda Schmidt and she and some helpers stitched around the clock to get the quilt finished in the remaining three weeks before the show. The guild printed new raffle tickets and scurried to sell them.

Lawyer fees for this fiasco totaled over \$36,000. It demoralized the guild and found them considering bankruptcy and dissolution of the guild. They survived with the help of donations from members and non-members and a host of fund raising activities.

The moral of this story: be aware that many quilt block and quilt designs are under the protection of copyright laws which means that **before** you can use them for a profit making activity, you **must** get permission [preferably in writing] from the person who created the design. Changing colors or the size does not make it your original design. Rule of thumb: Get permission and give credit for your inspiration or find a different inspiration.

Garage Sale!!!

Start sorting!! Our crafter's, quilter's, and needleworker's garage sale will be held on Saturday, April 5th, 7:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. at Trinity Presbyterian Church, 1600 West Rollins in Columbia.

Won't this be a good time to clean out all those things you haven't used in the last 2-3 years (and probably never will) and make room for "new goodies?" After all, half the fun of quilting is buying and collecting new "stash" goodies.

Set up will be on Friday, April 4th from 3:00 – around 8:00 p.m. or later. Please plan to drop off the donations at the church on the north side of the building through the door on the left hand side which you enter by going over a little "walk-way." That will take you directly into the room where the sale will be held and you can avoid going through the church.

The items you donate should be related to crafting, quilting, or needlework, such as books, magazines, patterns, fabrics, ribbons, trims, or other craft supplies of all sorts... you get the drift. PLEASE measure any fabric yardage, roll and wrap with painter's tape or masking tape and mark the yardage on the tape: nothing smaller than an eighth yard. If each of you do this, it will save us HOURS of work on Friday. Don't price the fabric. Scraps and cuts that are not full width or smaller than an eighth yard will be placed in baskets or bins and sold by the zip-lock bag full. We had GREAT fun stuffing gallon bags last garage sale, and I have used the scraps I purchased a lot! What a deal for those who make charm quilts!!

We also need bags - grocery, shopping, plastic, paper or boxes for people's purchases.

Donations are final and anything left at the end of the sale will be culled by the quilt show Marketplace Committee and the committees that work on collecting and giving away quilts, and the balance donated to some other organization. I need a volunteer to supervise, select and distribute leftovers to a group, since I don't live in Columbia.

We'll need people to sign up to work Friday, April 4th between the hours of 3:00 p.m to 8:00 or 9:00 p.m. (whatever it takes) to set up for the early morning garage sale and to work Saturday during the sale 7:30 a.m. to around 2:30 or 3:00 p.m. for clean-up. We'll have sign-ups at March meetings, or you can contact Jackie Berry at jjoberry@missvalley.com to sign-up or ask any questions.

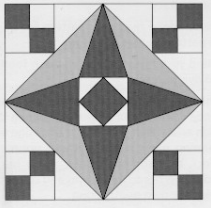
