## TIPS, TOOLS & TRICKS

We have received information from Dr. Margaret Ordonez, head of the textile conservation program at the University of Rhode Island and a PhD textile chemist about a "new" soap/detergent that has been given the seal of approval to use on historic cotton and linen textiles. It is "All - Free" which can be easily found in any large grocery store.

"All-Free" has both anionic and ionic surfactants which not only cleans more types of soil than does Orvus WP paste, but also rinses out much better. Although the current formula contains an optical brightener, it is not formulated for cellulosic fibers i.e. it does not affect cotton or linen fabrics.

Needless to say, all the guidelines given for wet cleaning historic textiles still apply as to the care one must use when handling fragile wet fibers.

#### **Quilt Show Etiquette** [Part IV]\*

The Submission Process . . . With the advancement of technology, the photography submission can vary widely. Slides of quilts may no longer be accepted and digital images may be the norm. Digital images must not be manipulated with digital image editing software.

Size Limitations . . . Accurately measuring the quilt should be one of the first steps in the paperwork process to || enter a show. Categories may be limited so measurements may be crucial to category selection. All shows have rules with respect to category placement and if the quilt is entered in the wrong category based on incorrect measurement, it can be disqualified.

Other Disgualifiers may include ... stains (unless on an-I tique or vintage pieces), pet hair or odors. Smoke is particularly unpleasant as it can migrate to other quilts that are nearby. The quilt should also be free of markings. Quilts with markings will either be disqualified or eliminated from the judging process.

Some shows disallow kit quilts. Kit quilts are defined as quilts where the pattern and fabrics are predetermined and prepackaged, often assembly line fashion. If kits are not allowed, remember that even changing some of the fabrics does not change the fact that it was from a kit.

Follow the specific information provided on method of construction and requirement for hanging sleeves. Avoid trying to enter a piece that requires a special hanging apparatus. Next month, a word about personal security information.

If the item you are thinking of bringing is a family heirloom please do not bring it since this show is open to the public. Bring something that can be replaced.

Please bring your prop items with your quilts to the Expo Center, November 21<sup>st</sup>. You will be able to pick them up with your quilts after the quilt show.

#### Quilt Show Entry Form (October meetings — last chance to hand-deliver)-

#### CHANGES in the quilt entry application are explained below. They are --earlier deadline, on-line registration, and a one-time waiver for submitting CEO and President quilts. Please read.

Our goal is to have 300 entries to hang, an average of 10 quilts per years of existence. We now have 29 with 2 President quilts and 2 friendship quilts. In order to get the program, map insert, and lay-out done in a timely manner, and accurately, our deadline this year is **October 24<sup>th</sup> (if mailed October 20<sup>th</sup>)**, which is about 10 days earlier, SO..... **start** planning your entries. (The difference is we are <u>NOT</u> taking applications at November meetings.) You must be a paid member to enter a quilt.

This year we **STRONGLY ENCOURAGE** you to type your entry directly into the form on the internet. This will make it much easier to do the labels. It also saves the guild money for printing costs. For those who sincerely shudder and shake at the thought of using the internet, we will be happy to accept the hand-written

forms. [NOTE: You will find the entry forms in the September newsletter, at the October meetings and

<u>on the website if you don't wish to do on-line entries.</u>] For anyone who is submitting entries by hand, you will also need to fill in your claim check, except the areas marked "to be assigned." If you do on-line registration, the computer will fill in the claim check for you. Kathy Singleton and Shirley Beckett were the first to enter on-line, and both indicated it was easy to do.

TO DO ON-LINE REGISTRATION, you need to know the information from the registration form, especially width and height (IN INCHES).

- 1. Go to BTQG website and click on <u>www.jackiequilts.com</u> (or go there directly).
- 2. Click on Online Quilt Submission Application. (We decided to eliminate the PASSWORD.)
- 3. Read the directions at the top, BUT basically you just click on each entry with your mouse and type. **Be sure** you pull down the arrow that says type of entry in order to choose CEO, President, Friendship, Wall hanging, decorative, etc. EASY.
- 4. When finished, hit "Submit Quilt."
- 5 Check your typing for accuracy.
- 6. If okay, hit "submit my entry."
- 7. Print your claim check and label (all filled out for you) **before proceeding**,
- 8. Then either click on "Submit another quilt," or hit the red X in the upper right hand corner to close windows. Again, EASY.

Note: If you choose "wearable" OR "decorative," identify the item by "decorative type," so that we can make arrangements to exhibit it properly. Then fill in approximate size. IF you enter a CEO or PRESI-DENT quilt, please indicate what year(s) you served such as 2007-2008 in your description.

<u>NEW ITEM</u>: The handbook says, "No quilt may be shown that has been in the BTQG show in the last five years." Technically, that means the last two shows. The board has, however, voted to make an exception for this show to allow past CEO and president quilts. We want to showcase quilts made for our leaders over the past 30 years.

We have also included friendship quilts on the entry form, because if we have enough, I'll group them together and we'll make a label explaining what friendship quilts are.

# Sliced Italian Cookies (Biscotti) (From the Kitchen of Cecile Mazan)

<ol> <li>stick of melted margarine</li> <li>3/4 cup sugar</li> <li>3 eggs</li> <li>1 teaspoon of flavoring (vanilla, almond, anise,etc,)</li> <li>1 1/2 teaspoons of baking powder</li> <li>2 cups of flour</li> </ol>	Add ins Almond flavoring, almonds and 1 cup dried blueberries. Vanilla flavoring, shelled pistachios and 1 cup chopped dried apricots.	
In a mixing bowl beat eggs well, add sugar and melted marga- rine, flavoring, flour and baking powder. Beat well. Dough will be sticky.	Orange flavoring, orange zest and 1 cup dried cranberries. 1 teaspoon grated ginger and 1 cup of dried cranberries.	
Make 2 log rolls per each greased cookie sheet. I spoon drop my rolls then go back with floured fingers and shape them into rolls.	Orange flavor & zest and 1 cup of chocolate chips. ** These will need to be cooled completely before cutting.	
Bake in a 375 degree oven for 25 min. until light golden brown. Remove and let cool for about 5 minutes, then slice diagonally about 1/2 inch apart. Place slices on their sides and return to the oven and bake for another 10 to 12 minutes until pale golden brown. Cool completely.	Drege bottoms in melted white chocolate or semi-sweet choco- late or drizzle chocolate on each cookie. Makes approx. 3-4 dozen.
