Day Chapter's Friendship Block — Mona Stevenson

Though I was born and raised in Columbia, I moved to NE Ohio after marriage, where I had a career in librarianship. We lived there for 32 years, before retiring and returning to Missouri to be near our families. Janice Haralson invited me to join the guild when we met on a tour while I stilled lived in Ohio. She and Suzanne Henage reminded me of that after I moved back. After my mother's estate was settled, I finally had the time for quilt-related activities.

My grandma, cousins and aunt had quilted, but my mother had not. About the time of the Bicentennial, a quilt shop opened nearby, so I took an introductory class. I still have the sampler I made in that first class, as well as some of my grandma's quilts. With work and church activities, I seldom found time to quilt much, though I made a number of baby quilts for friends. Our minister wanted new paraments for the sanctuary and gathered a group of craftswomen for that purpose. I designed and constructed 2 sets of quilted pulpit hangings with matching stoles for the ministers. Thus began my liturgical arts career. Since that time I've made about a dozen stoles, in addition to a variety of pulpit hangings and banners for churches here and in Ohio. In the 80's a neighbor wrote an article for a craft magazine about my liturgical projects. My only other claim to fame is having my studio in our new home shown in <u>Studios Magazine</u> last year.

My other hobbies are reading, needlework and puzzles.

I chose the Square in a Square block because it will be good for a scrappy look, is adaptable to a variety of settings and is easy to construct. My initial plan calls for at least 60 blocks. I know everyone has as many holiday projects as I do, so I wanted something fast. This will be the largest quilt I've attempted, so far. I appreciate your help with it.


