Many thanks to all for a successful and fun gift auction! Marty could launch a new career as an auctioneer.

At our meeting on January 7th, Bettina Havig will present a program on Medallion Quilts. Her interest in medallion quilts goes back to her days as a shop owner when she taught workshops on medallion quilts; she still teaches classes on medallion guilts. Historically, medallion quilts represent the style of the earliest quilts brought to American from England and copied here by quilt makers in the late 18thand early 19th centuries. She will share a brief look at early guilts and a trunk show of her own medallion quilts. Bettina will share some tricks for planning and making your own medallion quilts. The style is a traditional one, the very kind of guilt that she loves to make. In 2003 her book CLASSIC ENGLISH MEDALLION STYLE QUITS was published by AQS. Her medallion workshops adapt today's machine construction techniques to the classic design units of the historic English quilts.

Bettina will offer a workshop on medallion quilts at Quilt 4 U on January 26.

Planning ahead for May, Donna DiNatale will be with us. She is waiving her lecture fee in exchange for pincushions that will be sold at the IQSC and Museum. Thus, we are

launching Operation Pincushion. You may bring your pincushion donations anytime.



### **Medallion Workshop**

Bettina Havig will teach a Medallion Workshop, Jan. 26, 2019 at Quilt 4 U.

"CLASSIC ENGLISH MEDALLION"- 21st century style" Classic English Medallion (Frame) style quilts are explored with an eye to 21st Century techniques. The ten basic pieced units are constructed by cutting only three size strips. The workshop provides information for planning a medallion quilt including fitting the border sequences for a stunning result to put this classic style in your reach. You may defer the choice of central medallion until after you learn the framing units and plan your quilt.

### **Getting to Know Our Members**

A new little segment for our newsletter from time to time will be The Quilter's Interview for various new and renewing members. Thank you, Bettina, for providing our list of questions.

We're kicking the series off with our current CEO, Henrietta "Hank" Botts.

What attracted you to quilting? When we moved to Columbia in 1983, Country decorating was becoming popular and appealed to me. Quilts were in all of the magazines I liked and their history and beauty had a comforting and warm sense.

When did you start to make quilts? Did you take Classes? Where? When Bettina had "the Quilt Cottage" she offered a class to make an Amish doll. I took that class and enjoyed it and early on loved the fabric in the shop! I think I joined the guild in the early 90's but with being a full time mother, nurse, and spouse, quilting took a back seat. There was also a class taught by Rosalie Meters in her home. It was a large sampler block quilt and all was hand work— both piecing and quilting. There were 2 that got finished. Honestly, I am a fairly recent quilter... well if 20 years of so is recent!!

Were you a seamstress before you got interest in quilts? Our children wore clothing I made, especially our daughter. She could not go with me to pick out the pattern or fabric because she EXACTLY the dress or whatever was pictured!

Did your mother, grandmother, or aunts make quilts? If so, did you learn quilt making from them? I didn't know my grandparents. My fraternal grandmother did sew and only think I have from that generation is a Grandmother's Flower Garden top that she made. Mother and Aunts did not quilt or sew.

What is your favorite type of quilt? What part of quilt making do you like most? Here's where I get into trouble! When there are soooo many beautiful quilts how does one limit oneself? Finishing and gifting.

What do you do with most of the quilts you make? Most of the quilts I've made so far have been for grandchildren and I have one finished for our eldest son and his wife for Christmas this year. I can hardly wait to see if they like it.

Do you prefer to make bed quilts or smaller quilts like wall hangings and decorate items? All of the above! I also enjoy embroidery, wool applique, and have taken a class in punch needle.

**Is belonging to BTQG important to you and does it enhance your skills?** The guild has become very important to me especially for the friendships that have been my fortune to have. Also, the ongoing promotion of quilting is something on my list. And YES, I have learned a lot. Maybe the most important thing being that an expert quilter starts at the beginning and at one point had to learn the things that create an expert quilter.

If you relocated to another town or city would you look for a guild to join? Or would you quit quilting? I will leave our house here only when they carry out my cold, dead body, but should in another reality I have to move, a guild would be checked on before the packing began!
