Nobody Will Ever Know!

While I was growing up, we went frequently to visit my grandparents. My paternal grandmother, Lois Parker, had many talents, from baking bread to sewing clothing, baby gifts, stuffed toys, and other treasures for family and friends. It seemed to me, as a youngster, that Grandma could do almost anything, and she seemed to be so GOOD at everything she did.

During one visit, when I was spending a week with Grandma and Grandpa Parker, the three of us had just eaten lunch, and Grandma wanted to offer me a little something sweet for dessert. She opened the refrigerator and reached inside. There was a covered dish containing a fancy gelatin dessert with whipped cream on top, which she had prepared for a church function that evening. She spooned out a small portion onto a saucer for me, and then carefully swirled the whipped cream back over the disturbed spot.

I asked her, "Grandma, isn't that for the church ladies?"

She smiled back at me and winked. "Nobody will ever know!"

At another visit, Grandma was embroidering a crewel picture of a tree with birds perched on the branches. While she was stitching, she glanced up to speak to me, and the needle jabbed her finger. A drop of blood got onto the cloth. She rushed to the sink to dab water onto it, but the blood still made a stain. I wondered if she was going to get upset about ruining her pretty project, but she didn't.

"We'll fix this. Nobody will ever know!" she told me, with that wink again. I was taken home the next day, but I wondered what she would do.

The next time we came to visit, Grandma had completed the crewel embroidery, and the tree picture was framed and hanging on the living room wall. I looked at it closely, and saw that she had stitched some extra green leaves over the stain. A clever fix, and she was absolutely right about no one else ever knowing what had happened!

My grandmother never realized how much that expression would mean to me in my adult years. I have always admired her can-do attitude toward life. So many unexpected things happen in life that we can't control, but sometimes a creative remedy can be found. One of those events happened to me earlier this year.

I love to quilt with scraps, because they are always colorful, interesting, and filled with surprises. For this project, I had already sewn my four-patch blocks together, and was laying out the top onto my batting, before I noticed a little hole in one floral fabric piece. It looked like a weaving flaw in the material. The white batting showed through that hole like a laser beam. Of course, it was near the middle of the quilt top.

I was frustrated, but then I asked myself, "What would Grandma Parker do?"

Well, this descendant of Grandma Parker suddenly found inspiration from the legacy of

I Jackie Pruneau, which was shared with us this summer. I had I adopted some bright sew-on applique patches from Jackie's craft I room. I got them out and looked through the patches, and found I a cute ladybug that was large enough to mend the hole in the I quilt block. It blended right in with the flowers. I sewed the lady-I bug in place, finished the quilt, and donated it for someone at the I chemotherapy clinic.

While we can't fix everything, I remember my Grandma's atti-I tude, and try to help fix whatever I can. If that help can be done I in secret or behind the scenes, that is OK with me. Sometimes the I happiest endings are the ones in which "Nobody will ever know!"
