Snow Ice Cream

This 5-minute recipe for homemade snow ice cream is a sweet way to celebrate a snow day!

Ingredients:

- 1 cup milk (any kind)
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 pinch salt

8 cups clean snow or shaved ice (more or less, depending on density of the snow) Optional topping: sprinkles!

In a large bowl, whisk milk, sugar, vanilla and salt together until combined. Go scoop up some fresh, clean snow, and immediately stir it into the milk mixture until you reach your desired consistency. The ice cream should be fluffy, not runny. But it melts quickly, so dive in quickly. Top with sprinkles or other ice cream toppings if desired, and enjoy!

Little House In The Big Snowdrift

Do you remember Laura Ingalls Wilder's "Little House on the Prairie"? I grew up with those books, and the television series as well, and some of those stories impressed me very much as a child. A favorite one was the time Pa Ingalls had walked to the little town to buy Christmas treats and gifts for his family, but he became lost in a snowstorm on the way home. He fell into a deep, snowy ravine, and since he couldn't see to find his way out, he burrowed into the snow to make a shelter. He was so hungry that he ate the Christmas candy he had bought for the girls. In the morning, when the storm was over, he climbed out and found his way safely home again. Each time I read this tale, I tried to imagine how you could survive, surrounded by all that snow! That sounded impossible to me.

Fast forward from the 1800's to 1978, the year I was in third grade. A new student, Van Loy Hardy, joined my class in school that autumn. Van was adopted, and came originally from Viet Nam. He was the first Black person I had ever met. His family lived only a block up the street from mine, but I was a little shy of this new neighbor at first.

I needn't have worried about Van. He was a clever boy, and picked up English quickly. He was friendly, polite, and had a super sense of humor. It was a good thing, too, as he had many adjustments to make. I remember when drinking milk at school made him ill (many people from Asia have lactose intolerance). But Van came through these challenges with flying colors. He was a delight to play with, and he could make a creative game out of anything.

As autumn moved out, Van got to experience a real, old-fashioned lowa winter in his new hometown. We had some snow, and then more snow, and then a severe blizzard. School was closed for a whole week. Even my Dad was kept home from work. Our town was drifted deep in **many** inches of snow.

Finally, the roads were cleared enough for buses to run, and school could begin again. Van talked to me at recess, and eagerly invited me to come over after school and "see my house". I was puzzled by that, as I had already been inside of his family's house several times. But I was curious, so when the bell rang, we hurried home to his place.

All of the yards were full of snowdrifts. Snow ridges lined the streets. The Hardy lawn looked like all of the others, except that as we walked closer, I saw an old towel lying in a depression in the snow.

"Wipe feet!" Van told me, pointing at the towel, and then he ducked down through the snow, into a hollow. "Come in my house!!"

When I looked down after him, I was astonished. Van had dug out a passageway, and then expanded from that into little "rooms" under the snow. Some of his rooms even had window openings to the outside. Besides his improvised doormat, he had a camping chair, a box for a table, and even a burned-down Christmas candle on an old plate. His Mom had given him permission to light the candle, which also really impressed me at the time. It was not only a shelter you might survive in, it was downright comfortable and quite civilized.

Van called his creation "The Igloo", and we greatly enjoyed our wintertime version of Playing House. It was by far the coolest snow construction I have ever seen. We spent several happy afternoons at The Igloo, until the snow eventually melted.

As we grew up, I learned many lessons from my friend, Van Loy, and some of the deeper ones were about resiliency, being creative with what you have, and how to find the fun in just about any situation. But, that first shared winter, I was the most surprised to learn "When life gives you snow... make an igloo!"
